Much more than a collection of essays, **THOUGHTS AND ADVENTURES** is an undiscovered classic of twentieth-century prose. Each of the twenty-three essays is a pleasure to read. Of greater significance, they also show the reader the contours of the largest human questions of our age filtered through the lens of an extraordinary intellect.

Winston S. Churchill (1874–1965) served twice as prime minister of the United Kingdom, held numerous political and cabinet positions, fought in wars on three continents, and wrote more than forty books. In 1953 he won the Nobel Prize for Literature.

James W. Muller is Professor of Political Science at the University of Alaska, Anchorage. He is a By-Fellow of Churchill College, Cambridge, Academic Chairman of the Churchill Centre, and a recipient of the Farrow Award for Excellence in Churchill Studies. He is editor of *The Revival of Constitutionalism, Churchill as Peacemaker*, and *Churchill's "Iron Curtain" Speech Fifty Years Later*, and of new editions of *Winston Spencer Churchill* and *The River War: An Historical Account of the Reconquest of the Soudan*.
